#### **INVESTMENT STRATEGY**

In general, the investment strategy of the Fund will be to invest in an actively managed portfolio comprised of loans for projects which are linked, either through ownership or geographic proximity, to an Indigenous group or community that typically borrow against the value of their inventory and account receivables or other identifiable assets. The Fund is focused on opportunities with a strong degree of Indigenous involvement and connection to Indigenous communities located primarily throughout Canada. The Portfolio strategy involves a fundamental analysis intended to identify good investments that are overlooked by the general financing community and target diversification through asset type, investment size and industry.
